

Rose Wilder Lane

This pathfinder will be useful in finding information about Rose Wilder Lane. Today Lane is most famous as the daughter of Laura Ingalls Wilder, but she was a famous writer long before her mother. She worked her way up from advertising to winning an O. Henry Award and covered both the aftermath of World War I in Europe and the Vietnam War. In her final years, she is best known for her work with helping to create the Libertarian Party.
